PLANNING

Long range planning for the physical development of the City of Oak Park is the primary focus of the Planning Department. In addition to preparing and maintaining the Master Plan the department is responsible for the administration of the Zoning Ordinance and other planning tools to achieve the goals and objectives listed in the plan. The day-to-day operations of the planning and zoning functions for the City include addressing a considerable amount of phone calls, emails, and visits from the public, as well as administrative duties including preparation of public hearing notices, meeting minutes, scheduling of meetings and preparing meeting packets.

For those seeking project specific approvals, staff spends a substantial amount of time with potential applicants to ensure they have a clear understanding of their options as well as the process involved for each one. Staff diligently works with developers through the site plan review application and encourages all to attend a pre-application meeting prior to submission.

Summary

The Planning Commission is a nine-member volunteer board appointed by the Mayor and approved by the City Council. They are responsible for planning the future growth of the community and review of specific development projects including special use permits, zoning ordinance amendments, and property rezoning requests. The Planning Commission is also charged with the preparation and adoption of plans for the City including the Master Plan and Capital Improvement Plan.

The Planning Commission meets at 7:00 P.M. on the second Monday of each month in the City Council Chamber. Planning enabling legislation outlines that the Commission should represent a broad spectrum of interests, including industry, transportation, commerce, education, agriculture, etc.; this same statute outlines that the Commission should represent the various geographic areas of the City. As provided for by statute, there are two City Council members

appointed to the Planning Commission each with voting rights and one member of the Planning Commission also serves on the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Planning Commission Meetings

Site Plan Review Process – Customer Feedback

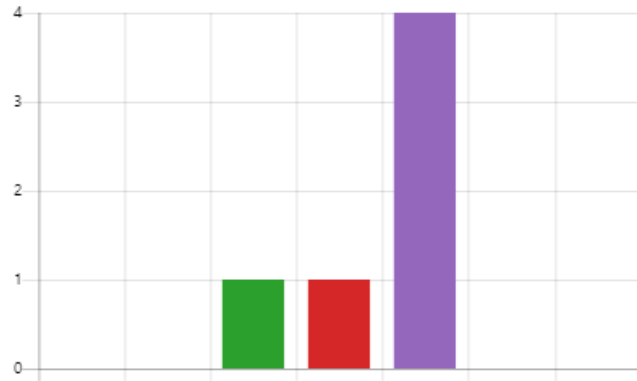

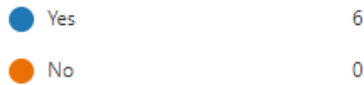

Planning Commission Training

Throughout the year the City Clerks' office has informed the members of any training opportunities. We encourage members to attend these training courses and to notify the City Planner of their attendance so that we may track it.

Master Plan

The Master Plan for the City of Oak Park outlines the goals and strategies which will guide the City over the next five years. The plan provides vision, goals and strategies to direct future land use and guidelines to enhance the community's appearance.

Implementation of the Master Plan Goals

Through the City's Master Plan the Economic Development and Planning Department has begun adopting the changes as identified in the Master Plan. A great deal of progress has been made on its numerous implementation actions. Some of these implementations are listed below:

The adoption of the new City's Zoning Ordinance and Master Plan, is the highlight of these implementations. The updated Master Plan creates a framework to guide decisions that affect the social, physical and the economic environment of the City.

Community:

- **Goal 2: Expand Housing Options.** The approval of the proposed development of 30-unit Transit Oriented Apartment encourages new housing style to meet the needs of current and future residents.

Commerce:

- **Goal 1: Create Vibrant, Dynamic Commercial Corridors.** The approval of Kroger Store to be allowed to carry a specialty designed merchant and specially designated distributor license that expands their services platform, and Berkely Coffee to develop a coffee shop with mocktails and entertainment, promotes for diversity of uses and amenities that will satisfy the public needs.
- **Goal 2: Attract High Quality Diverse Restaurants.** The approval of the development of Berkely Coffee which will serve baked goods, coffee, and mocktails.
- **Goal 3: Provide Streamlined, Business-friendly Permitting Process and Easily Obtainable Resources for Businesses.** The Economic Development and Planning Department worked diligently with the developers of Kroger Store, Pioneer Health care, Hutch's Jewelry, Alta Cremation & Services, Berkely Coffee, and Ferlito Group to provide resources and speed up the appropriate development and approval processes (Administrative Approval, Site Plan Review, and Special Land Use).
- **Goal 4: Revise and Improve Commercial Parking Zoning Regulations and Municipal Parking Options.** The Economic Development and Planning reviewed, analyzed, and revised the parking requirements of the Zoning Ordinance utilizing best practices; for example, the provision of off-street shared parking and bike parking.
- **Goal 5: Update Maps, Zoning, and Ordinances.** The approval of zoning map amendments that changed some industrial properties from Light Industrial District to Industrial Flex District to allow for transitional industrial areas to foster a mixture of live/work areas. Zoning changes were also made at the intersection of Nine Mile and Coolidge business districts rezoning from B1, Neighborhood Business and B-2, General Business to MX-2, Mixed Use District to allow for a variety of uses and upper level housing opportunities. In addition to the approval of multiple text amendments to improve the outdoor dining areas and to allow for additional wall sign and limit the size of some temporary signs. Eventually, this will improve the visual appearance of the city, spur investment, and create a vibrant community.
- **Goal 7: Redevelopment of Blighted or Underutilized Buildings.** The Economic and Development and Planning Department reviewed, revised, and proposed new landscape standards for new and existing developments, as well as new design standards for new development.
- **Goal 10: Improve Industrial Areas.** The new Zoning Ordinance provides design

standards and landscape and screening standards which address the various districts within the city; residential, commercial, and industrial. In addition to the approval of text amendments that changed the zoning of some light industrial properties to industrial flex districts to foster a mixture of live/work areas.

Future Planning Goals

The Economic Development and Planning Department with the guidance of the Planning Commission will continue working toward accomplishing the goals of the Master Plan to strengthen our community, enhance our diverse culture, and stimulate commerce, as summarized below:

Community

- Improve appearance of alleys and explore better ways to utilize the space. *On-going*
- Identify opportunities and pursue areas for new public spaces. *On-going*
- Discourage new surface parking lots adjacent to pedestrian-oriented commercial corridors and encourage the placement in the rear of the building. *On-going*
- Improve connections to neighboring communities, amenities and other bike trails. *Mid-term*

Culture

- Update Zoning regulations and allow green storm water infrastructure design. *On-going*

Commerce

- Encourage development that promotes pedestrian over auto related parking requirements. *On-going*
- Enforce regulations to ensure quality developments. *On-going*
- Continue pre-development meetings with all necessary departments to speed up the development and approval process. *On-going*
- Revise parking requirements utilizing best practices of other cities and consider shared parking and payment in lieu as alternatives. *Short-term*
- Update Future Land Use Map. *Short-term*
- Identify opportunities and create multi-use transitional zones from commercial or industrial into neighborhoods, as well as buffers to protect residential areas. *Mid-term*
- Consider Form Based Code and create design standards for new development. *On-going*
- Review landscaping standards and add landscaping/screening buffers to industrial area to reduce the negative visual characteristics of these developments. *Mid-term*
- Improve overall appearance of the Industrial Park and encourage development of public spaces as part of new industrial development. *Mid-term*

Zoning Board of Appeals

The Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) is the only board authorized to interpret, waive or modify requirements of the City of Oak Park Zoning Ordinance. This Board operates as a quasi-judicial body similar to a court of appeals. Decisions made by the Zoning Board of Appeals are final. Relief from ZBA decisions are granted only by the Circuit Court.

Zoning Board of Appeals Meetings

During 2020-2021, the Zoning Board of Appeals conducted four regular scheduled meetings. Eight meetings were cancelled for lack of business. Following is a summary of Zoning Board of Appeals action from the past year:

- 07/28/2020** APPROVED - CASE NO.20-01: Kenyatta Spratt, 21331 Kipling St. Property Identification Number: 52-25-31-426-031, appeal request for three variances from the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance as follows:
- I. Article XVI, Section 1600, requires the minimum lot width of a parcel to be fifty (50) feet. The applicant requested a waiver of two (2) feet, nine (9) inches for two (2) parcels, resulting in two (2) parcels; Parcel A being forty-eight (48) feet, two (20 inches and Parcel B being forty-eight (48), one (1) inch.
 - II. Parcel A: Article XVI, requires that the sum of both side yards shall be fourteen (14) feet. The applicant requested a waiver of the five (5) feet, four (4) inches on Parcel A to allow for the sum of both side yards to be eight feet (8), eight (8) inches.

- III. Parcel B: Article XVI, requires that the sum of both side yards shall be fourteen (14) feet. The applicant requested a waiver of five (5) feet, four (4) inches on Parcel B to allow for the sum of both side yards to be eight feet (8), eight (8) inches.

09/22/2020 APPROVED - CASE NO.20-02: Kyle McKechnie, 8625 Capital St. Property Identification Number: 52-25-33-152-010, appeal request for one variance from the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance as follows:

- I. Article XVII, to allow for an existing building that does not meet the parking requirements of the Zoning Ordinance

10/27/2020 AMENDED AND APPROVED - CASE NO.20-03: Kristen Hipwell, 14021 Labelle Rd. Property Identification Number: 52-25-29-230-005, appeal request for two variances from the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance as follows:

- I. Article XVII, Section 1717, A,2 requires that fencing shall be thirty (30) inches in height or less. The applicant requested a waiver of eighteen (18) inches to allow a fence to be forty-eight (48) inches in height.
- II. Article XVII, Section 1717, A, 2, requires that no fence shall extend toward the front of the lot farther than the front building line, except for fences which serve as architectural or decorative landscaping and are not used to enclose property and are thirty (30) inches in height or less. The applicant requested a waiver to allow for a fence in the front yard that will enclose the property to the sidewalk.

Amendments of approval:

- I. To allow a fence with a setback of 6 feet.
- II. No requirements for the color of the fence.

05/25/2021 APPROVED - CASE NO.21-01: Michael Ferlito, 8775 Nine Nile Rd. Property Identification Number: 52-25-33-101-006, appeal request for one variance from the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance as follows:

- I. Article XVII, Section 1726 Off Street Parking and Loading G. Table requires that 2 parking spaces per unit be provided for multi-family developments. The applicant requested a variance of 27 parking spaces to provide 33 parking spaces on site.
